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

Theater-going takes extra effort these days and we are so pleased that you are here. This year's Festival was produced via hundreds of hours of volunteer efforts by creative, talented, and committed folks who wish to bring quality theater experiences to the Santa Cruz County community.

Here are some behind the scenes numbers for the 2025 Festival:

- Over 300 plays by playwrights across the country were submitted to our annual 10-Minute Play Contest, now the longest-running short play festival in the world.
- Our reading committee chose 24 top-ranking favorites; 16 to be produced in the 8 Tens @ 8 Festival and 8 runners up to be featured in our Best of the Rest staged readings coming up in March 2025.
- Sixteen local directors were chosen to work with the playwrights, select their cast, and bring these works to life on the Actors' Theatre stage in two separate shows.
- This year's Festival scheduling allows for viewing both the Part 1 and Part 2 shows over a weekend, or even in one day with our matinee options.

We appreciate your support of Actors' Theatre by attending our performances and encourage you to consider further involvement in our endeavors. 

Linda S. Gunther (Speed Dating) has been performing in local theater in the Santa Cruz and Silicon Valley areas for more than 20 years, and has studied acting with the British American Drama Academy at Oxford University. This is her second season with 8 Tens @ 8. Linda's artistic focus over the last few years has been on writing. Her published works include over 65 short stories featured in various literary journals across the world. After writing six published suspense novels, including Death is a Great Disguiser (a Santa Cruz Murder Mystery), Linda's memoir titled A Bronx Girl (growing up in the Bronx in the 1960s and 70s) was most recently released in 2023. Linda's belief: "Acting in theater heightens my ability to stay authentic in my writing, and vice versa. There's a symbiotic relationship between the two art forms. I love them both."

Star Hagen-Esquerra (*Duels and Détentes*) (they/them) is a multidimensional artist, puppeteer, performer, and drag artist specializing in game design, interactive media, fine arts, puppetry, animation, storytelling, props and visual effects. Their art centers upholding traditional storytelling with an emphasis on fantasy and horror as modes of reflecting reality. You can find them performing at the Puppetry Institute's "Middleof," and at drag shows across the bay like the Monster Show SF.

Meg Herz Harlor (*Happy Anniversary*) has been active in local theatre since 1974. She has been in over 80 productions from 1974 to 2009 as well as having directed, written, produced and done backstage work. She is thrilled to be back on stage. Helene Simkin Jara (Facing the Demon) received her BA in Theatre Arts from UCLA in 1969. She has performed in Los Angeles, NYC, and at The Western Stage in Salinas, Carl Cherry Center for the Arts in Carmel, Scotts Valley Performing Arts, Pisces Moon, SEE Theatre, and Cabrillo College. She is also a frequent collaborator with Actors' Theatre, having directed eight 8 Tens @ 8 shows, as well as acting in five Best of the Rest shows and ten 8 Tens @ 8 shows. In September 2020, Helene was featured in *Side x Side*, a Zoomed play reading of three short plays by Jory Post, presented by 36 North Playwright's Collective. Denise Keplinger (Exit Strategy) has a BA in comparative drama from Stanford University, and taught high school and then middle school for 30 years. She wrote curriculum on the side for an online learning company and was a guest of the French government for a summer to teach and develop pedagogical methods using theater techniques to further educational goals for teaching the French language. She's one of a handful of teachers who taught both theater arts and second language acquisition using each to inform the other. Her most successful ongoing acting role is playing Mary Anning, a 19th-Centruy paleontologist who presents her fossil finds for the edification of fine Victorians at Dickens Faire and the Academy of Sciences in San Francisco.



Sibri Khalsa (The Use of Children) is thrilled to be in her debut performance with the 8 Tens @ 8 Festival. She most recently performed as Scuttle in All About Theatre's production of *The Little Mermaid*, previously performing in more than a dozen other musicals. Outside of theatre, Sibri loves dancing, cross-country running, and hanging out with her friends.



Michael LaMere (The Nearest Far Away Place) is performing in his fifth play in the 8 Tens @ 8 Festival and acting onstage for the first time in four years. Outside of acting, he enjoys writing, making short films, and playing music with his band Chamberlains of the Plague.



Chloe Mae (Balloon Release) is so excited to be partaking in her first year of the 8 Tens @ 8 Festival! She has been learning and studying acting since a very young age and all throughout her educational years. Although in her most recent years since graduating high school, she has been taking acting on in a much more serious sense as she has found it ignites a deep sense of drive for her. Some of her most recent past work includes Molly in A Home for Christmas, Julie in End of the World, and she is also currently in the production of Cabaret being produced by Renegade Theater as pre-show cast.

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THE DIRECTORS



Kathryn Adkins (*Director, The Bargain*) is a music and theater specialist, educator. She performed with Opera Theater of St. Louis, played leading ladies for Cabrillo Stage and South Bay theater groups, and soloed with Santa Cruz music organizations, including the Santa Cruz Symphony. She taught acting and directed musicals for the Cabrillo College theatre department until retirement in 2020. She is co-founder and current VP of Programs for NextStage Productions, a nonprofit company bringing performance opportunities, education and improved health through the performing arts to mature adults. Steven Capasso (Director, The Use of Children) is an actor, improvisor, playwright, and director. He has performed with the Actors' Theatre 8 Tens @ 8 Festival since 2008, as well as with Mountain Community Theater and Cabrillo College. Last year he directed "On the Road to Tikrit" for the 8 Tens Festival. Favorite roles include Morty (Nobody's Hero, 8 Tens Reboot, 2022) Cheswick (One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, MCT, 2022) Stan (SWEAT, Cabrillo College, 2020), Kit Carson (The Time of Your Life, Cabrillo College, 2019), Sawyer (Miracle on 34th Street, MCT, 2024) and Lendell (Almost Maine, Cabrillo College, 2021). In 2017, Steve performed his solo show You Always Remember at the United Solo Theatre Festival in NYC. He is a member of 36 North, a playwright's collective.



Marcus Cato (Director, Closing Time) has acted and directed in the annual 8 Tens @ 8 Festival since 2011. He has acted for many local theater companies including Jewel Theatre, Santa Cruz Shakespeare and its previous incarnation Shakespeare Santa Cruz. He was a company member, actor and director for ten years with the former Bear Republic Theatre. As an arts administrator, he enjoyed a career of over 35 years in Santa Cruz, working with Shakespeare Santa Cruz, Tandy Beal & Company, and the Bear Republic Theatre. Marcus studied theater at the University of Illinois and the California Institute of the Arts.
